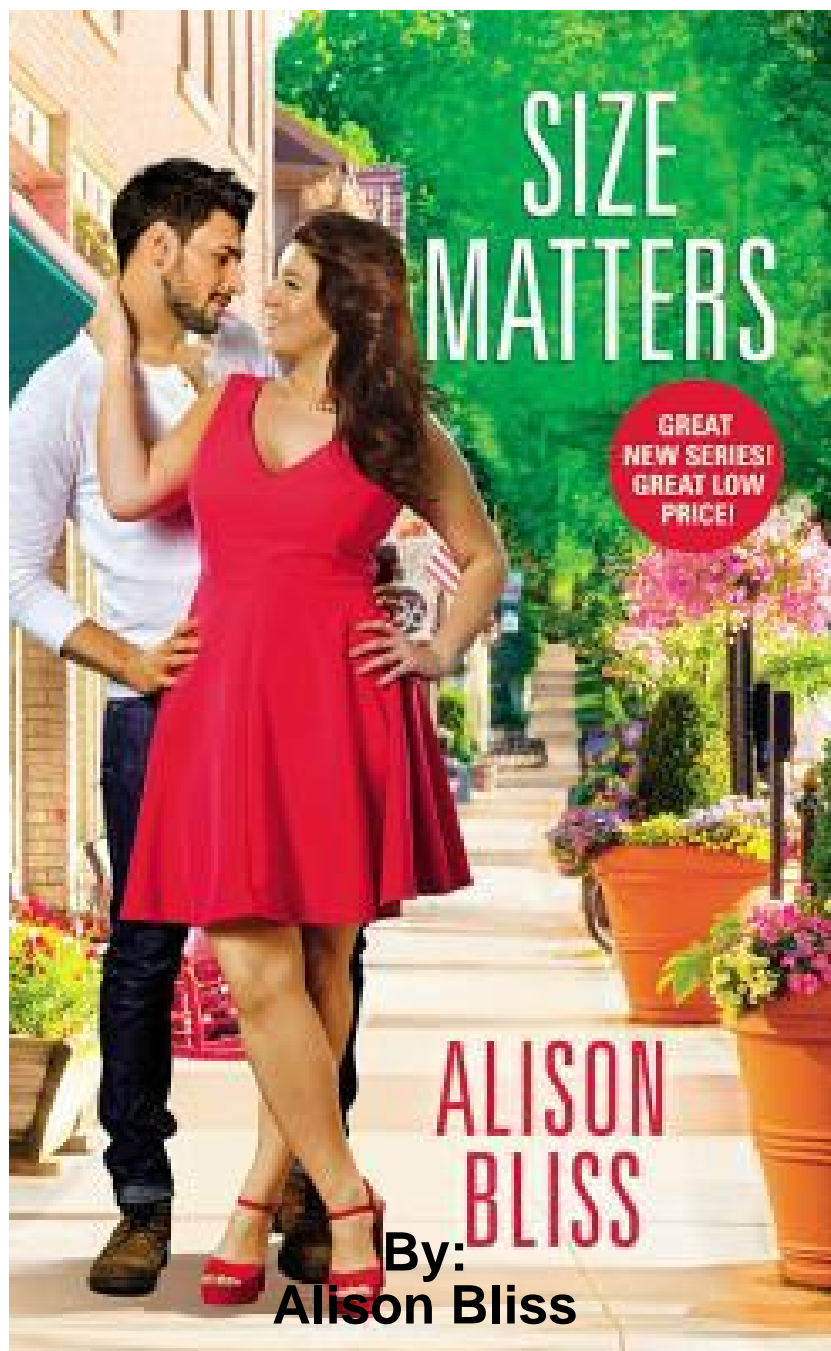

-The Good: I have a weakness for BBW heroine romances. Whenever I get a chance, I have to add one into my reads because I like being able to relate to the heroine and for the most part, when I get a BBW romance, I can't help but bump it up my review/read list. When I saw this book I was all on it. Basically, a fake engagement mixed in with a big and beautiful woman and the man who loves her? If Sam had been a rock star and/or billionaire, I would have been in trope heaven.

As my first Alison Bliss book, I liked the setup for Leah and Sam's romance. Leah and Sam had

good chemistry, and when Ms. Bliss focused on their dialogue and allowing them to really interact with each other, the story was entertaining and had immense potential. There are some genuinely humorous moments between them and I think Leah's friendship with Valerie was genuine and fun. I loved that Sam was attracted to Leah from the very beginning and loved all her curves.

-The Bad: Unfortunately, you could also call this Negative Nellie and The Waffler. Leah has an unrelenting negative self-image and especially in the beginning, is obsessed with her weight and sees every comment through the lens of her own self-hatred. Sam is annoying in his own way, as he waffles continuously between wanting to be with Leah and not wanting to want her. He says it to himself (and the reader through his inner monologues), over and over. The negative and self-doubting comments were exhausting and definitely took down a lot of my enjoyment of what could have been a very good contemporary. Their personal character arcs suffered from a focus on their foibles early and often, and not enough focus on their journey to acceptance and an HEA.

-Everything In Between: Leah's negative self-image is clearly tied to her own mother's constant harping on her, and that mitigated some of my annoyance. I wish more time had been spent earlier on having Leah push back, because the change from constant self-hate to her acceptance of herself occurred all at once, all at the end, and it was distracting. Sam's knowledge of Leah's self-worth issues made his personal gaffes all the more painful to read because he could immediately tell she was insecure and yet he repeatedly said the wrong thing at the wrong time. When he protected her it was lovely, I just wished he did it more often. As a result, I wasn't sure I bought into their love. I could believe they liked each other, but both of them desperately need some time to deal with their own issues before they could be ready to love each other.

It was ok. A book that had its enjoyable moments but was overshadowed by a lot of negative inner monologues and uneven pacing.
